Connecting Classrooms-Our Virtual School Trip to Nepal!

On Wednesday 8th December, a long-awaited Zoom call took place with our partner schools both in Nepal and in the UK.

After a few connectivity problems, we gathered many of our children together and connected with children in their classrooms in Nepal. The children in both countries enjoyed taking part and listened intently during the 30-minute call. A representative from each class was able to ask a question and these varied from, 'What time does your school start?', 'How many children are there in each class?' 'Do you celebrate Christmas?' and perhaps the favourite, 'What do you like to eat?' We shared information about our national dishes and discovered that the majority of people in Nepal are Hindus and therefore do not celebrate Christmas. The Nepalese do celebrate many other festivals though. We found out too that in Kathmandu and Bhaktapur they do not have snow, which surprised many children because Mount Everest is in Nepal. Our children picked out a lot of similarities between the schools in the two countries and also pointed out some differences.

Our children were also amazed that the older Nepalese children could speak English so well and that for the children in Nepal it was nearly their home time, when we had only just begun the day! We hope that we will be able to have more zoom calls in the future to learn from each other and collaborate further on projects.

speaking competitions, experienced specialist lectures and engaged in college visits. This was all in addition to the 70 plus school clubs that meet on a regular basis.

All pupils attend two assemblies each week. One focuses on year group achievements and the other addresses issues relevant to life in modern Britain including Black History month, mental health, remembrance and informed consent. Role of the Estates, Facilities and Compliance Manager for SYMAT



Hi, I'm Jenny Scholes the Estates, Facilities and Compliance Manager for SYMAT

I have worked within the SYMAT central team for the past 3 years, having previously worked as a School Business Manager in a number of primary schools across York for over 14 years. My background is in facilities management and health and safety and this role gives me the opportunity to share my knowledge and experience with others.

I can often be seen walking around in my high vis jacket liaising with contractors. Since working in the SYMAT, I have worked closely with Project Managers, contractors and schools to secure bids from the EFSA and others to ensure that our school buildings are maintained for the future, these include:

- Three roofing refurbishments at Fulford School;
- New gas boiler at Dunnington to replace the old oil boiler;
- Safeguarding works at Escrick to improve perimeter fencing and electronic access gates Jan 2022;
- New build expansion at Fulford School £6.5 m new extension and remodelling works Jan 2022 ;
- Re-roofing works AYJS bid submitted for EFSA CIF (Condition Improvement Fund) round 2022-23;
- A number of smaller re-modelling works have taken place at Fulford School new Pupil Support Unit, 3 new changing room facilities, new computer room, a number of temporary classroom unit installations, to name a few.

Each school undertakes three health and safety audits a year, and where possible, I attend each audit to support the Head and School Business Manager to ensure that all our schools remain compliant with all statutory regulations.

It is a diverse role where you can guarantee no two days are the same. It is a privilege to work closely with many different groups of people, all with the same goal of providing a safe environment for staff and students to teach and learn makes for a challenging but rewarding job within the SYMAT.
